January 15th “Change” Worship Leader Rev Paul Walker

January 22nd “Music” Worship Leader Margaret Robinson

Margaret shared some music she enjoys including Spring Song by Felix

Mendelssohn; Look at the world by John Rutter; and Thank you for the music by ABBA. We sang hymns 230, 116, 132, 133 and 38 from SYF all with a music theme. We had the following readings: Listening by Richard S Gilbert; The song of the Tree by David Doel and Tale of the church piano by Doris Mary Hay. Then Margaret told us of her love of music, having had piano lessons from age 7 and singing lessons a few years later. Margaret belongs to Yarm Choral Society and has sung both in Durham and Cathedrals, she joined an online choir during Covid lockdown and has been in choirs since High School. Margaret then asked members of the congregation to share their thoughts on music.

January 29th Worship Leader Rev Margaret Kirk

“The race is not to the swift nor the battle to the strong.”

Ecclesiastes

Margaret gave us the story of Chaitra and Maitra by Katha Sagar from Hindu Wisdom for Everyone, we sang hymns 43, 11,79 and 45 from Sing Your Faith. Margaret included a meditation and sharing of Joys and Concerns, where we looked at things that had happened to us that had given us joy or we were concerned about.

5th February Worship leader Rev Paul Walker

"Light" was Paul's theme and he looked at it from many angles. 40 days after a baby was born in Israel they were to be presented in the Temple in Jerusalem. 40 days after Christmas is February 2nd. While Matthew has Mary and Joseph fleeing to Egypt, Luke tells us that they duly brought Jesus to Jerusalem where he was seen by an old man, Simeon who called him a 'light to lighten the Gentiles'. On the 1st February is the pagan festival of Imbolc, the halfway point between the winter solstice and spring equinox. Imbolc is marked by the burning of lamps and bonfires, the Christian Feast is often called 'Candlemas' when all the church candles for the following year are blessed. Every week we light our chalice. We use the metaphor of light to describe so many things and on Sunday he explored the uses and misuses of that metaphor. For example how we have subtly confused light with white and dark with black.

Mary Magdalene – Saint or Sinner?
Mary Magdalene is mentioned in all four of the New Testament gospels and is the key figure in the discovery of an empty tomb. But who was she and why was she so closely associated with Jesus and his mother and sister? And why was she the "first witness" of Jesus' empty tomb later turned into a repentant sinner? These opposite portrayals of Mary shed light on how a movement for sexual equality became a bastion of patriarchy.



Unitarian Weddings Initiative – “All you Need is Love”

Advertised as “Would you like your Chapel or Meeting House to become the perfect place for a wedding this year?”, this online event was hosted by Rev. Melda Grantham, who leads on the Unitarian Weddings Initiative. Unitarians from across the UK joined in to hear Rev. Melda Grantham, Rev. Phil Waldron and Joanna Drake share ideas, stories, and practical tips to help Unitarians develop their buildings as a wedding venue, ably hosted by Lizzie Kingston-Harrison on Monday 16 January 2023. We heard some excellent advice from some very experienced wedding venue managers, including what to do if your chapel is bang in the middle of a busy city centre with no parking!

What stood out was the need for professionalism, if your chapel or church is going to be a successful venue in the middle of a crowded market – this was especially emphasised by Rev. Waldron. It’s certainly the case that any congregation thinking of doing this should seriously consider if you have the resources in terms of experienced co-ordinators and organisers, and assistants – perhaps best of all, paid assistants – to offer people the best experience you possibly can. If not, it’s best to get the infrastructure in place first rather than risk letting people down. The stories were inspirational, and it’s great to hear Unitarians moving forwards. Many thanks to Rev. Grantham for organising it, and to the speakers!

Brian Michael Hopkins (4th Sept 1939 - 27th Dec 2022)

As confirmed by the reflections on his life and the tributes paid at his funeral, Brian's was certainly a life well lived and he was loved and respected by many.

I have so many memories of us growing up together in Thornaby with our parents and late brother Terry and later baby sister Janet, of our schooldays and our youth. Some of you will still remember Brian's early activities with the Unis – not only as Church secretary and for his role in the IRF, but also as a performer in youth club concerts and a player in the football team. His love of fishing starting in his teenage years is legendary.

Alan and I shared happy times with Brian and his late wife Merla in our younger days - at the folk club or on memorable holidays, making toys with "Taste", a company we set up as a hobby and later on, wonderful family times with Brian and Merla and their children Michael and Lynne along with us and Colin and Helen.

Good times were spent over the years with the growing family and there couldn't have been better hosts than Brian and Merla at numerous unforgettable occasions for the whole extended family.

How will I remember my brother Brian?

I will remember him first and foremost as a family man, devoted to his wife, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren but equally caring for all members of the wider family. He was a man of his word – totally reliable and dependable.

Organised – if he and Merla were going on holiday, their cases and/or their caravan were always packed well in advance. Brian hated being late for anything. Helpful – always willing to make time for others. Honest – he was a man of few words but what he said was truly what he thought or believed. Hospitable – Brian and Merla were generous when inviting family or friends to their home.

Brian was also extremely brave and despite the pain he must have felt from the many serious falls he had in the last year or two of his life, he never complained. Asked how he was feeling after such an event, his answer more often than not was "Champion" or "Magic".

In short, I couldn't have wished for a better brother (or sister-in-law) than Brian and Merla. They are both very sadly missed.

Down to earth, direct, plain-spoken
