The period between 1st August and 31st October is said to bring the gift of maturity. It is a time of physical harvest and spiritual garnering. Sunday services reviews for June, July and August 2024

Sunday 30th June 2024 a Service to Celebrate Church Membership was led by Jean Watson

Jean opened the service with a chalice lighting by Celia Cartwright, the Readings were "A person is a puzzle" and "Our Longing for Community" by John O'Donoghue and two responsive prayers. She told us a story about a man's very old and worn shoes which got him into a lot of trouble and expense.

"We sang Come together in Love", "Let us renew our covenant", "To Worship Rightly", "Here we have gathered" and "Go now in peace".



We welcomed two new visitors together with four other people in the chapel and four people joining us on Zoom.

We stood and read our **Church Affirmation:** I value the fellowship of this Church and seek to enrich it I value my giving to this Church and seek to give I value my receiving from this Church and seek to receive I value my yearnings within this Church and seek to be satisfied I value my faith embodied here and seek to develop it I value my worship within this Church and seek to heighten it I value my membership of this Church and seek to declare it.

Sunday 7th July 2024 there was no service at Stockton, as we visit Whitby for the afternoon service at Flowergate Chapel (see Louise Reeve's report and photos)

Sunday 14th July 2024 the Flower service was led by the Worship Group

Opening words: Our symbol of community, One flower for each of us, One vase for all of us. Each of us needs to receive, Each of us needs to give freely, lovingly, and so we grow. For this we gather.

We sang Moods of Summer, Bring flowers to our altar, We can become and A Church is not where altar stands.

We had a Meditation on Things of Beauty - light, winter, flowers, shadows and being with friends.

The readings were What flowers mean to me by Sally H Jones, Flowers by Reme Green, Cottage garden by Patience Strong and Longing for community by John O'Donoghue.



Everyone brought a flower to place in the vase and at the end of the service took home a different flower.

Sunday 21st July 2024 was led by Rev Margaret Kirk Unfortunately this service had to be cancelled as Margaret K had covid.

Sunday 28th July 2024 was led by Rev Paul Walker on the theme of "Anger, its use and abuse." We sang: We are a gentle angry people, God weeps, When I am frightened, and For everyone born. We can get angry at injustices, war and cruelty, which urges us to do something about it.

Sunday 4th August 2024 was a Bring & Share service on the theme of "The Sea" Members of the congregation brought contributions of poems, readings, music and spoke about holidays by the sea when young.. We sang : There is a place I call my own, A Melody of Love, All These Things Belong to Me, and Spirit of Life.

Sunday 11th August 2024 No service, as members of the congregation were on holiday.

Sunday 18th August 2024 was led by Rev Jeffrey Bowes, Vice-President of the GA Jeffrey had these Readings: The Supreme Reality in The Thought of God, "If thou knowest the gift of God" John 4:10; and Can Man Change His World? From Living in the Question.



The hymns were Source of Life, Source of All, The Harvest of Truth, and The Best **Things.** His address was on the theme of Acts of Random Kindness and Senseless Beauty. The phrase "practice random kindness and senseless acts of beauty" was written by Ann Herbert in 1982. This message spread widely through car sticker, on walls, on business cards and on stationery, 'Guerrilla goodness'.

Jeffrey asked "What could any of us do?" something like litter-picking, keeping a churchyard tidy or the village grass verges clear of litter and the grass mown, planting flowers, smiling or greeting strangers you meet on your daily walk. You'll feel better and so will all the people who see these acts of kindness.

Sunday 25th August 2025 was led by Margaret Robinson

Margaret opened with the music "What gets in the Way" sung by Sharon Little. The Chalice lighting was by Dawn Buckle and the Opening words were by Michael Allured. We sang: Come and find the quiet centre, Leave behind your bags and baggage, What shall we say to them and Spirit of Life. Her readings were from "Soul Deep" "Bear's Blue Backpack" by Kate Dean, "Religious Baggage", "Being the Answer to Big Questions" and "The Power of Good" and the Closing words "Greater Equilibrium" all by Michale Allured.

The Guided visualisation was "Travels With My Backpack" and then members of the congregation were asked to think about some questions, which they could write down or draw if they chose, while music was played "I'm a Barbie girl" played on the piano by Josop Castanyer Alonso in the style of six classical composers (Mozart, Beethoven, Schumann, Schubert, Chopin and Ravel). Questions were "What would you like to leave behind, so that you can be free to become your authentic self, what ideas and practices continue to stifle you, what brings you a feeling of peace and wellbeing?

The service ended with the music "Look to the World" by John Rutter

The Spirit of Community

We've all experience a sense of wonder and magic when a great choir performs sacred music. Sometimes the sound feels as comfortable as a soft blanket on a cold night. At other times, its power and majesty roll over us like a huge wave, knocking us to our knees. The musical experience touches us deeply in a mysterious way, awakening our emotions.

The effect is even greater when we participate in singing together. Joined in song, our emotions are not merely stirred; they merge and dissolve with the emotions of others, deepening our human connection. Our voices create a net of sound that binds us tightly together. When we gather to sing sacred songs, the song and the act of singing together strengthen our spiritual community by bolstering our sense of fellowship.

The word *spirit* is derived from the Latin *spirare*, 'to breathe.' The act of singing moves our breath, the essence of our spirit, from our deepest core out into the atmosphere. When we sing together in singing meditation, the benefits are reciprocal: The act of singing strengthens the community, and the group's camaraderie enhances the beauty and power of the songs.

Singing in community produces a tangible power that doesn't exist when we sing alone. As an experiment, sing a song alone, then sing with recorded music, then sing the same song in the presence of others who are singing the same song. Notice which of these forms affects you most powerfully.

Singing in community increases the effect music has on us.
